

We learned (pg. 43) about the four rabbis who entered the פַּרְדֵּס. One of the rabbis, אֶלִישָׁע בֶּן אֲבוּיָה, became a heretic known as "אַחֵר" ("the other one").

His student,

one of the greatest rabbis of his generation. He did not accept that his teacher had strayed.

After he had strayed from the

path of Torah, רַבִּי מֵאָיר remarked to רַבִּי מֵאָיר, "just as gold or glass vessels can be fixed if they break, so too a Torah scholar who sours can repent and be fixed."

"So you, too, should return to your Torah ways!" exclaimed רְבִּי מֵאִיר.

But אַחֵר thought it was too late for him.

"I have already heard them say [in Heaven] everyone can repent...except for אַחֵר," When אַחָר died, there was a stir in Heaven. On one hand, he could not be sent to be punished in the sent to be punished involved himself in the study of Torah which protects one from such

punishment. On the other hand, אָחֵר clearly could not enter the World to Come because of his great sin.

אַתָּר suggested אַתָּר be cleansed of his sins first in גַּהִינִם and then be allowed into the World to Come.

When רְבִּי מֵאִיר died, smoke rose from רַבִּי מֵאִיר grave showing he had entered גַּהִינֹם. When גַּהִינֹם died, the smoke stopped rising showing that אַחֵר had been accepted into the World to Come.

> "What will come of us?" asked a worried רָב יְהוּדָה. How could anyone be sure *they* wouldn't sin?

> "Sharp one," answered שָׁמוּאֵל, "they were always evil in their hearts from their earliest days. But your heart is pure." רָב יְהוּדָה therefore did not have to worry.
