

Do you like cleaning your room? If you don't, you probably wouldn't like cleaning up ashes.

But in the הַמְקְדָשׁ (Holy Temple), the ashes from the הַרְבָּנוֹת (sacrifices) were removed every day. This was such an important duty that many כֹּהַנִים sought it out.

They would show up bright and early and race each other up the ramp of the מְיָבֵח (Altar) from where the ashes were removed. Whoever reached the last four אַמוֹת (cubits, about 7 ft. or 2 m.) of the ramp first, won the privilege.

What would happen if two or more לְהַנִים tied for first place? They would stand in a circle and raise a finger. A Temple official would remove the hat from one of the לְהַנִים and call out a random number that was greater than the assembled לְהַנִים. He would count the כֹהַנִים's fingers beginning with the hatless , and would continue counting around the circle as many times as necessary until he reached the number he called out. The לֹהֵן whose finger was counted last won the privilege of clearing the ashes.

What is the source that it is forbidden to count people?

וָהָיָה מִסְפַּר בְּנֵי יִשְׂרָאֵל כְּחוֹל הַיָּם אֲשֵׁר לֹא יִמַד וָלֹא" יספר...'
