

# DAF YOMA KIDS

#### Inside the Daf

We have learned that any קָכָּך that can become טְמֵא (impure) may not be used for a סוּכָּה covering. This applies to processed materials. For example, רַבָּה בַּר חָנָה says (in the name of רַבִּי יוֹחָנֶן) that combed flax cannot be used as סְכָּך since the process has begun to turn it into linen. Raw flax, however, can be used as סְכָּך since it grows from the ground and has not been processed to be made into material.

Foods can also become טָמֵא and therefore may not be used as רַב יְהוּדָה.סְכָּךְ says that ferns and artemisia herbs may be used as סְכָּךְ since they are foods not fit to be eaten.

אַבּיֵי warns against using artemisia because it has a very foul smell that will cause people to leave the פוּכָּה entirely!



### Steps to Making Flax



Retting: Soaking flax stems to loosen the fibers



Scutching: Beating the stems to separate the fibers from the stem



Spinning: The long soft fibers that remain are spun into linen thread



Hackling: Fibers are combed to remove the remaining stem bits and to separate the long fibers from the short ones

"Hmmm, maybe you're right," admitted Doniel. "Besides, my father won't be here to help me during the test anyway!"



#### Did You Know...

If you dig out a hole in a haystack it would not be a valid סוּכָּה. This is because סְכָּף must be placed intentionally on top of the סופָה and not come about "automatically."

## A 7172 Moment Bundles of 727 The Wood Be-120



Even though straw, wood and stalks are valid as קֻׁכַּדְּ, they cannot be used when they are bundled together.

At times, workers returning from the field would carry

bundles of wood or straw on their shoulders. When they got home they would put these bundles on top of their huts to dry. When the holiday of סוכות would arrive, these workers would enter their huts and rely on these bundles to act as סָבָך.

This would be a problem. Remember: סָכַך must be put atop a סופה to provide shade. These workers put the bundles on top of their huts to dry – not to act as shade. Anyone who would sit in these huts wouldn't be sitting in a valid יסוּכָּה!

To avoid this mistake, the חַכְמִים (Sages) outlawed all types of bundles from being used as סָכָּד. That way, no one would even think to sit in a סובה with a bundle of wood or straw as its roof.
