


# DAF YOMA KIDS

## Inside the Daf



A כֹּהֵן who drinks wine may not perform services in the בֵּית הַמִּקְדָּשׁ (Holy Temple) until the effects of the wine have gone away. For this reason, בֹּהְנִים who are about to serve in the בֵּית הַמִּקְדָּשׁ may not drink alcohol beforehand.

If it was a להון's turn to serve in the בית הַמְקְדָשׁ that day, he may not drink alcohol during the day or at night. Even if a שהן will

not be serving in the בֵּית הַמְקְדָשׁ that day, he still may not drink wine that day if he will be serving later (or earlier) that week. This is because he is on "standby" as extra help in case a large amount of sacrifices are brought that day. Since his help may be needed to offer the sacrifices that day, he may not drink alcohol.


We see from here that as long as there is even a chance that a הַמִּקְדָּשׁ might serve in the בֵּית, he may not drink alcohol. So what about nowadays? After all, the Holy Temple may be rebuilt at any time and פֿהָנִים will once again be called to serve their duties. Does this mean that even nowadays פֿהָנִים may not drink wine?

says that בּהְנִים may drink alcohol nowadays. Since so many years have passed without the Temple being rebuilt, we don't have to worry about it being rebuilt suddenly.

We are also taught that the פֿהֵן נְּדוֹל used to have his haircut every Friday so he would look his best when he was first seen by the new shift of פֿהֵן on the Sabbath. When the Holy Temple stood, a regular פֿהֵן

If you have ever been to an important family celebration like a wedding or bar mitzvah, you were probably taken to have your hair cut beforehand to look your best.

During the week that a פֿהֵן would serve in the בֵּית הַמִּקְדָּשׁ, he would not be allowed to have a haircut. Why not? בְּה בַּר בַּר חָנָה explains (in the name of בַּה וֹחָנָן) that this was to force the פֿהֵן to get his hair cut before his week of service began. That way, he would enter his holy duty looking his finest.

A בְּרֵיְתָא teaches that a Jewish king must have a haircut every day. This is because we are told to behold a king in his beauty (see ישעיה לג,יז, Is. 33,17).
