

divorces his non-פֿהֵר wife, she may no longer eat תְּרוּמָה since she is no longer a part of the 'פֿהֵר's family.

The בְּתָרָא asks what would happen if a בְּתָרָא gave his wife a שֵׁל (divorce document) and told her that the געט doesn't work right away to divorce her. Rather, he says, the שֵׁל will work to divorce her *one moment* before his death. May she still eat הְּרַנְּמָה?

The answer is, no. Since any person may die at any time, the פֿהֵן, too might die one moment after his wife has eaten his יְּרוּמָה. That would mean, his wife was divorced from him at the time she ate the יְּרוֹמָה. A divorced wife of a פֿהֵן may not partake in eating יּתְרוּמָה.

This case is an example of how the Sages were sometimes worried even about the small possibility of a person's death.



Until 40 days pass, a human fetus is "only water."



The גְּמָרָא taught that until 40 days pass, a fetus is "just water." After 40 days, an osteocartilaginous skeleton is formed giving the fetus its characteristic human form. At around this time, the face develops a human shape and "limb buds" become clearly defined fingers and toes.

An-Insane-Marriage

Even though marriage is a very important in Judaism, there are some people who are not allowed to get married.



Take an insane person, for example. Someone who is insane cannot marry anyone. Even if he performs an act of marriage that would usually work (like giving a woman a ring and, in front of witnesses, asking her to marry him, or taking her under a חופָּה or wedding canopy) the marriage still does not work.

Therefore, if the insane person is a פֿהֵן who performed an act of marriage with a non-פָּהֶן woman, she may not eat תְּרוּמָה even though she would if the פֿהֵן was not insane.

Also, if the woman was the daughter of a פֹהֵן and still living in her father's house and eating הַּרוֹמָה (see pg.22), she may still continue to eat הָּרוֹמָה if a non- performs an act of marriage with her. Even though an act of marriage with a non- would mean that the daughter of the הַה may not eat הְּרוֹמָה any more, since the marriage of an insane non- בַּהַן doesn't work, she may still eat הָּרוֹמָה.

A Dita Moment

Shimon was firm in his decision. Yoni didn't let him use his basketball the day before, so he wouldn't let Yoni use *his* soccer ball today.

"Are you sure that's a good idea?" asked Shimon's teacher when hearing his decision. "The decisions you make today can affect untold generations. We learn in the אַקָּבֶּא how Amonite and Moabite may never convert to Judaism because they were merciless, refusing to give the Israelites bread and water. Be careful about your decision to act mercilessly. Who knows how it will affect you later on?"
